Prerequisites: A passing grade in English as a Second Language 244; or qualifying score on the English as a Second Language placement test. Students may also take English as a Second Language 251 and 253 concurrently.

Course Description: ESL 252 is a high-intermediate reading course designed to provide students opportunities to learn, practice, and refine their reading skills. Over the quarter students will do an extensive amount of reading and writing. The emphasis will be primarily based on reading comprehension and critical thinking, together with vocabulary building and language use. Assignments will include: fiction and non-fiction readings, classroom-text readings, and written assignments. Through the assignments students will develop and practice these skills, with the goal of becoming successful independent readers.

## **Student Learning Outcomes:**

- 1. Demonstrate comprehension of literal and inferred meaning of level-specific reading materials.
- 2. Identify organization and rhetorical modes of extended reading materials.
- 3. Identify the main and supporting ideas of a level-appropriate text.
- 4. Demonstrate understanding and usage of level-specific vocabulary in readings.

## **Learning Objectives for the Course:**

- Demonstrate literal comprehension of extended written materials
- Answer comprehension questions based on inferred meaning from context of extended written materials
- Recognize the use of comparison/contrast and classification in extended written materials
- Expand recognition vocabulary
- Read and comprehend sentences containing targeted grammatical structures
