Student Learning Outcomes: 1. Practice writing as a multi-step process including planning and revising with attention to varying purposes, audiences, and rhetorical strategies. 2. Read and analyze rhetorically and culturally diverse narrative and expository texts from a variety of perspectives.

They can log in "as you" and help you specifically with any question. They are available 24/7 and are amazing people. Do not contact me for technical issues. Only contact me for course content issues. I have no ability to see what you see, and thus am useless in helping your with any technical concern. In addition, if you claim you turned something in and it failed, I contact them, so we can resolve the dispute. They can help me by telling me when you tried to submit, etc. I actually cannot see that

information unless I call them. So we are all quite dependent on Canvas Support to keep this running smoothly! Keep that phone number handy at all times.

Imagine for a moment that you are taking a traditional course, and you are running late to campus because your bus connections are not working. Whose responsibility is it to get to campus on time? Your teacher's or yours? Obviously, it is yours. Imagine similarly you are taking a traditional course and you misplaced an essay, or perhaps you are having printer problems. Whose responsibility is it? Your teacher's, or yours? Of course, yours!

Similarly, in this online course, if you are having trouble using Canvas (the equivalent of "getting to campus"), you are having trouble finding assignments, or you are trouble turning things in, that is your responsibility. Feel free to contact me regarding **course content** issues (e.g. "I read the essay assignment, but I do not understand what you mean by !"), but always call Canvas for everything else. It is **your sole responsibility** to address the sometimes steep learning curve involved with using an online course platform, just as it is your responsibility to get to campus and print your essays in traditional courses.

In this transfer-level composition and research course, we will practice critical reading, writing, and thinking. We will be reading two one book-length works, several essays, and a few short stories, all of which will allow us to examine American culture through different lenses. Additionally, we will spend time developing a writing voice, thinking about diction, practicing various styles of writing, and honing our own style. Students who try hard will, by the end of this class, be able to do all of the following: enroll in English 1B; write college-level essays; analyze arguments in print and other media; write for a variety of audiences and purposes, and be ready to give in-class presentations.

NB: This course will require substantial time and effort. Be prepared to spend 10-20 hours per week on the material. There is **a lot** of reading—the average for 1A is 600 pages in a quarter. In addition, you will be writing 6000 words! Get ready to roll up your sleeves and work hard with me! I'm really excited to be your teacher.

Participation: Weekly Discussion Forum: Every module, you will be responding to a Discussion Forum post. You will also be responding to your peers' responses. These responses will need to be substantive, thoughtful, and well written. I expect a minimum of 3 responses to your peers, one of which can be a response to their own response to your entry. If you do the bare minimum on the discussion forum, your grade will reflect that. Go deeply into the questions and try to engage your peers when you respond. In addition, you must have your initial response in at least 24 hours before the deadline for full credit to give your peers time to respond. You may submit your peer responses right up to the deadline.

Grammar: This is a writing class; as such, you need to learn the correct rules of grammar and composition. The book we are using, *Focus on Writing*, will be an important component of this course. I recommend you complete all of the assigned reading before you take the weekly quiz, as the questions will be based on the reading for that week.

Freewrites: You will be required to do timed freewriting sessions per week. In the freewrites, you need to really explore the material, but you will not be required to have perfect grammar. You **must write freely for the entire allotted time**. The whole point of freewriting is to write continuously. So, if it is a 10-minute freewrite and I see you stopped at 6 minutes, you will not get full credit.

Peer Editing: We will be peer editing for several essays—be a thoughtful, kind and considerate peer reader. All peer editing will be done through Canvas, and it is imperative that you follow all instructions and deadlines. Peer Editing is not easy for students to navigate, so for the first assignment, please make sure to allow ample time to figure out how to do peer editing in the course management system. I will be providing you links from Canvas support, or you can call Canvas support. Failure to have a draft on peer editing day will reduce your final paper grade by 10%.

LATE WORK: Late work is not allowed. However, I will generally allow you to turn an assignment in late with a steep penalty of 20% per day. This penalty cannot be renegotiated, and I do not guarantee that I will grade late work before the last day of finals week. **Please, do not submit assignments to me by email. If you submit something by email, I might not see it. No assignment is considered submitted until it has been submitted properly per Canvas directions.**

For most essays, you will have process points—which means you will receive credit for turning in outlines, introductory paragraphs, drafts, and reflection. Failing to complete the process points will damage your essay grade considerably.

Essay Rubric:

I grade your essays on the basis of letter grades. My assessment involves years of experience and is expressed in numbers as follows:

98% A+

You might be wondering what constitutes an A, a B, or a C. Here is a guideline on which you can base your interpretation of my grades. Obviously, a B+ essay would have some characteristics of an A paper and some of a B paper. Essay grades are non-negotiable and final. Essay Lengths:

All essays should be typed using Times New Roman 12 point. You will need 1 inch margins, and you must double-space.

Essay 1: 3 pages

Essay 2 4 pages

Essay 3: 4-5 pages

Essay 4: timed final online

Final Reflective Essay: 2 pages
