Introduction to Accounting at De Anza College

Requisites: (Not open to students with credit in ACCT 1AH.)

Advisory: EWRT 211 and READ 211 (or LART 211), or ESL 272 and 273; MATH 212 or equivalent.

Welcome to Financial Accounting I. Accounting is the language of business. Knowledge of accounting is important for all students who expect to go into business or work in the business environment. Accounting 1A is the first in a three course series, offered at De Anza. Accounting 1A and Accounting 1B are financial accounting courses with emphasis on meeting the accounting needs of various users, particularly those who are external to the business entity, such as stockholders, financial institutions and government agencies. Accounting 1C is managerial accounting. The focus of managerial accounting is to provide the financial information needed for decision-making within the business entity.

The specific student learning outcomes for this course are that you be able to:

1. Demonstrate knowledge of double entry accounting for business transactions and adjustments; prepare, explain and analyze financial statements using Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP).
2. Analyze fundamental business concepts, how businesses operate, how accounting serves them and identify ethical issues in an accounting context.

More specific learning outcomes are introduced as we study chapters 1-9.

Course Overview: This is an online course and it has the same rigor as one you would experience on campus. We will use several resources to make sure that you have a complete experience. Canvas (your homeroom) is the course management tool offered through the De Anza College Online Education Center. CCC Confer (cccconfer.org) is used for our weekly online meetings, which are recorded and closed captioned for later viewing. CengageNow2 will give you access to your textbook and online resources. All of these resources are available through your *Canvas* website, 24/7.

Purchasing your text is the most important thing that you need to do before class starts. The required textbook/e-book for this class is **Accounting, 27th Edition, by Warren, Reeve & Duchac** with **CengageNow2** from South-Western/Cengage2 Publishers. Purchase of this text gives you access to the *required* online tool (CengageNow2) where you will submit all of your homework, take your exams and have a number of useful resources. You will need an **access code** to get into CengageNow2.

The best option for the text and access code is the Student Edition from the De Anza College Bookstore where Chapters 1-9 have been especially packaged for you. This includes CengageNow2. You may purchase your text on campus or online at books.deanza.edu. This special edition text is by special arrangement with the publisher and is only available through our bookstore.

To summarize your book options:

Option A: Buy one-third of the book from De Anza Bookstore in loose-leaf format. This option includes a quarter-long ACCESS CODE for the required online Internet access to CengageNOW2. Homework and most quizzes are completed online at CengageNOW2. When you take Accounting 1B and Accounting 1C you will buy additional loose-leaf text pages and additional quarter-long ACCESS CODES. You should save your proof of purchase in case you are unable to complete the course. You may be able to get a replacement code from CengageNow2 if you dropped or failed the course and you end up retaking it. This is probably the most straightforward and least expensive option. (books.deanza.edu)

Option B: Buy directly from CengageNOW2. You can buy ACCESS CODES with varying time limits and full copies of the text. The code alone (while active) allows you to access the text in electronic format (e-book) and to do the online homework and quizzes. Be sure to save your proof of purchase. Again, you may also request temporary access (approximately 14 days) at the login website, through Canvas.

Option C: Buy the entire textbook from another source. In this case, you will still need to buy the ACCESS CODE from CengageNow2. This is probably the most expensive option.

Reminder: Be sure to record and save your login and password. When you register, please use your official name...the name you used when you enrolled at De Anza. This will help make sure that you get credit for all of your work.

Student Evaluation

Grades in this course are earned by student efforts...not “given” by the instructor based on student needs. A progress report, which includes a summation of all required and optional activities, is posted within a few days after each mid-term exam.

Your final grade will be assigned according to the following scale: A+ 98-100%, A 93-97%, A- 90-92%, B+ 87- 89%, B 83-86%, B- 80-82%, C+ 77-79%, C 70-76%, D+ 67-69%, D 63-66%, D- 60-62%, F 0-59%.

In summary, by registering for this course you agree to the following:
